About the Life After Burn Study

The Western Australian Patient Self-Reported Impact on Quality of Life After Burn Injury: Part 1 – Ultralong Follow-up After Burn (ULFAB) study is a Western Australian research project led by the Fiona Wood Foundation and the Burn Service of WA. It is the first local study to explore long-term quality of life after burn injury, inviting adults who have received burn care in WA since 1993 to share their voices.

By completing a one-time confidential survey, participants can help researchers build a clearer picture of life after burn injury. These insights will inform future care, services, and research, aiming to enhance recovery and quality of life for individuals now and in the future.

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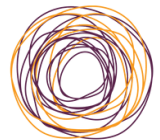
